INTERNATIONAL STUDIES CAPSTONE GUIDELINES

Completing a senior thesis or internship is one of the graduation requirements for all students in the International Studies program. This guide will help you with any questions you might have in regards to preparing and completing your capstone project.

The capstone consists of 2 independent study courses taken together, either ISP 493 + ISP 494 for the internship option or ISP 495 + ISP 497 for the guided thesis option. Here are the options:

ISP 495 Guided Research Thesis (2 credits): Students will develop more fully a paper they have already written in their disciplinary track or in an International Studies core course, incorporating interdisciplinary perspectives and foreign language sources in consultation with their capstone mentors. (20-30 pages)

ISP 497 Summary in the Foreign Language Studied (1 credit): Students will submit a written summary of their research thesis (3-5 pages) and complete an oral evaluation.

OR

ISP 493 Internship in International Studies Work Experience (2-5 credits). The Internship (ISP 493+494) fulfills the capstone requirement in International Studies. Working with a faculty mentor from one's disciplinary track, the student will complete a log and an analytical paper written in English that connects the student's work experience to the knowledge acquired in the IS program. The student selects, and the faculty approves, the professional organization and the internship location.

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ISP 494 Internship Journal in the Language Studied. (1 credit) The student will write a 3-5 page summary in the foreign language studied, as well as a journal discussing and synthesizing his or her experience during the internship.

APPLICATION AND REGISTRATION FOR THE CAPSTONE:

• October/March: Start thinking about a completed paper that you would like to develop OR find an internship for at least 8 hours/week during the following semester. Approach possible mentors to determine if they would be able to work with you on the capstone. Note: you may choose someone other than your track / major advisor as a mentor.

• by November 1/April 1 at the latest: Submit thesis proposal form or internship proposal form to the Director of International Studies for consideration by the International Studies Faculty Committee.

• **December/May**: Once your proposal is approved by the International Studies Faculty Committee, the next step is to **register for two separate Independent Study courses with 2 approved mentors.**

You will register for ISP 493 and ISP 494 if you are doing an internship. You will register for ISP 495 and ISP 497 if you are doing the thesis. You cannot register for these courses on CLASS but must use paper Independent Study Contract forms. These can be procured from Michelle LoPresti and must be signed by you, your major advisor, the Director of International Studies, and Dean McShane in the CAS Dean's Office prior to registering for the two courses. **Registration should be completed before you leave for Winter/Summer Break**.

* **December/May:** If you are choosing the internship option, once the internship is approved, **submit the Internship Approval Form** (below) to the IS Director.

• **During the capstone semester:** Continually work and regularly meet with your track and language mentors to complete your project.

CRITERIA FOR EVALUATION OF THE CAPSTONE

ISP 493 Internship / ISP 494 Internship Journal in Language Studied: students are assessed on how well they:

• apply learned theories and/or concepts to a particular practice

• broaden and enrich own perspective by relating learned theories and/or concepts (e.g. in a multicultural and/or interdisciplinary context)

• refine/deepen understanding of learned theories and/or concepts through the internship experience

• identify strengths and/or weaknesses of learned theories and/or concepts through the internship experience

• analyze and evaluate points of congruence and/or incongruence among elements of learned theories

• demonstrate functional linguistic proficiencies as well as cross-cultural knowledge of another civilization

ISP 495 Guided Research Thesis/ ISP 497 Thesis Summary in Language Studied: students are assessed on how well they:

• apply learned theories and/or concepts to a particular practice

• demonstrate familiarity with the background of topic and place it in global or international context

- identify and characterize the problem/issue from multiple perspectives/disciplines
- employ and integrate research materials from at least two languages
- show evidence of cultural awareness and its integration into the analysis

• arrive at a defensible conclusion and cogent solution

• demonstrate functional linguistic proficiencies as well as cross-cultural knowledge of another civilization.

INTERNSHIP CAPSTONE: SUGGESTIONS FOR DAILY REFLECTIONS

The foreign language journal (for ISP 494) is to be submitted bi-weekly (every other week), at least seven times during the course of the semester. It should be typed and be approximately 650-700 words in length (double-spaced). You will also be required to keep a log for ISP 493. The following guidelines are suggested and may be related to your final paper. You should consult with your mentors about how to write your log and journal and what to include—what you agree on may or may not be related to what is below.

Note that the foreign language journal is based on the English language log, so your foreign language mentor will respect the criteria set with your mentor in Business or International Relations. However, if your English language journal is snippets of ideas or field notes, you will probably need to reformat or summarize for your foreign language journal so that it makes sense in paragraph style format.

You should see your journal as an opportunity to gather notes and data about your internship. The foreign language journal is an opportunity for you to demonstrate your language proficiency, as such, an opportunity to work out grammar, style, and usage in the foreign language studied. The foreign language journal is not only an exercise in writing in a foreign language, but also an opportunity to express the daily experiences of the internship and reflect on the connection between the internship and your major. In addition, the foreign language journal—like the English language log—should provide a starting point for you to engage in substantive discussion with your mentors.

Your foreign language journal and your English language log may be a series of "field notes" with daily reflections about your internship. You may want to use your writing to start to think about your final analytical paper. One of the goals of your writing is for you to have material to reflect on during discussion with your English language mentor for ISP 493.

Below are suggested journal ideas for linking actions and observations from your internship to theories and concepts from International Studies. These suggestions may also be useful for developing your final analytical paper for ISP 493. (Again, you and your mentor may agree on different criteria.)

• Explain the mission of the organization and your position. Explain the relevance of the organization in terms of the international studies major (reflect on past courses). In that regard, reflect on what has been surprising or unexpected about being in this workplace.

• Review past syllabi and course materials for your international studies courses. Make a list of relevant readings related to your internship. Discuss four to six that are most relevant and explain briefly, how they are related to the mission of the organization. (This may include a theory or concept that you think should make sense and help explain the work of your organization, but it does not.) Again, how does this fit with what you expected or did not expect based on your international studies major? In other words, how does your international studies training help you to make sense of the mission?

• Discuss your responsibilities—both clerical and substantive. How do your substantive duties fit into the overall mission of the organization (for example, explain if you working on a specific project and how it feeds into the organization's mission).

• Describe a recent meeting, report, or activity of your organization. Explain it with specific reference to a theory or concept from a reading you have done for your major.

• Starting with an explanation of a theory, concept, or approach, can you give evidence of their application in your organization? In other words, does the work of your organizations support, contradict, or shed light on the theory, concept, or approach? Explain with specific reference to reading you have done for your major. If you use more than one theory, concept, or approach, be sure to show a relationship between them. (What is their relationship to each other? Do they fit together? Do they contradict each other?) For example: What broad perspective of international relations best accounts for the work undertaken by your organization? Provide multiple examples to show how that approach is evidenced.

• With the internship almost complete, review your entries and revisit your ideas. Do you have a deeper understanding of any theory or concept? Has your opinion changed in any way? How might a specific theory or concept help the decision-makers in your organization?
