1. To be eligible for the Graduate Communication Sciences and Disorders (CSD) Scholarship for the 2026-2027 academic year and beyond, you must be accepted into an eligible graduate program, and enroll as a new Adelphi graduate student.
 - Each admitted Communication Sciences and Disorders student is reviewed holistically for consideration of a scholarship of up to \$8,000.
 - Students may enroll in **9 or more credits per semester** with awards ranging up to \$1,600 per semester at the Garden City campus.
 2. The level of your award will depend on your actual enrollment. To qualify for the award, you must be enrolled in at least 9 credits per semester. Enrollment in fewer than 9 credits will make you ineligible for the award.
 3. This award, in combination with all other tuition-specific awards, cannot exceed the cost of tuition and fees.
 4. This award may not be combined with any other forms of scholarships, grants or remission. If the amount of the Adelphi University Graduate Communication Sciences and Disorders award exceeds any of the above-mentioned forms of institutional aid, then this scholarship will replace any award of a lower amount.
 5. Adelphi alumni enrolled within the Communication Sciences and Disorders program are ineligible for the Graduate Communication Sciences and Disorders award and will be automatically considered for the Alumni Award for Graduate Study.
 6. You must notify Adelphi's One-Stop Student Services Center of any additional scholarship or award you receive. Your award may be adjusted to ensure compliance with all institutional, federal, and state regulations, and to ensure total aid does not exceed tuition and fee costs.
 7. While not required for this award, it is advised to annually file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA®) with the U.S. Department of Education. After filing, eligible students will receive a College Financing Plan (CFP) outlining costs and aid.
 8. Adelphi University reserves the right to revoke or adjust this award based on academic or behavioral violations, changes in enrollment, or eligibility for other federal, state, or institutional aid.
