GETTING STARTED

HONOR CODE

The University is an academic community devoted to the pursuit of knowledge. Fundamental to this pursuit is academic integrity. In joining the Adelphi community I accept the University's Statement of Academic Integrity and pledge to uphold the principles of honesty and civility embodied in it. I will conduct myself in accordance with ideals of truth and honesty and I will forthrightly oppose actions which would violate these ideals.

This code of academic honesty prohibits behavior which can broadly be described as lying, cheating, or stealing. Violations of the code of academic honesty will include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1. Fabricating data or citations
- 2. Collaborating in areas prohibited by the professor
- 3. Unauthorized multiple submission of work
- 4. Sabotage of others' work, including library vandalism or manipulation
- 5. Plagiarism: presenting any work as one's own that is not one's own
- 6. The creation of unfair advantage
- 7. The facilitation of dishonesty
- 8. Tampering with or falsifying records
- 9. Cheating on examinations through the use of written materials or giving or receiving help in any form during the exam, including talking, signals, electronic devices, etc.

Any student who observes or suspects a violation is encouraged to report the violation to the appropriate professor, to any member of the Committee for Academic Honesty, or to the Provost's Office, which will forward the charge to the Committee.

THE COMMITTEE FOR ACADEMIC HONESTY

The Committee for Academic Honesty is made up of 12 students and 12 faculty members. It works to promote an atmosphere of academic honesty and to educate the Adelphi Community about academic honesty.

In the case of infractions of the honor code, the Committee investigates, mediates and ultimately, if necessary, provides a formal Hearing Board.

Students may volunteer to be a part of the Academic Honesty Committee by submitting their names to the Student Government Association.

GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

Throughout its Adelphi University has been committed to the idea that a strong liberal arts and sciences education prepares students for the complexities and challenges of life.

The General Education Program consists of a series of courses designed to provide students with important academic skills, a broad and rich educational experience and an appreciation for university life. The requirements are designed to help students become educated participants in our society by preparing them to meet the challenges of the present and the future.

Students must fulfill the General Education requirements to graduate. It is suggested that students complete the requirements within the first two years of study. In your freshman year, you will take the following General Education courses (unless you are in the Honors College, Levermore Global Scholars, or General Studies Programs which have their own requirements):

- First Year Seminar (0952-110) A four credit course offered in a seminar format, it introduces the student to a faculty member teaching in her or his area of special interest.
- Art & Craft of Writing (0122-107) An introductory course in academic writing in which students will learn to read critically, think analytically, imagine an audience, draft an argument using appropriate language and structure, and edit for clarity and correctness.

AP, IB CREDITS AND COLLEGE CREDITS EARNED IN HIGH SCHOOL

As you begin to plan your semester schedule, take into account any college credits earned through special examinations or programs offered in your high school. You are responsible for having official notification or transcripts sent to Adelphi University. The sooner you make these arrangements the better. Keep in mind that it will take several weeks for receipt of official notification.

If you have taken Advanced Placement (AP) examinations sponsored by the Educational Testing Services (ETS), you must ask ETS to forward your scores to Adelphi. The Adelphi University code is #2003.

You may not receive additional credit from Adelphi for those courses for which you have AP credit. If you have taken an AP exam but have not received your scores you can call 1-888-308-0013. With a valid credit card you can find out your score. Please also visit collegeboard.com

You may also receive credit by earning an acceptable grade on other selected tests, such as:

- The International Baccalaureate (IB) Higher Level Examinations
- The Cambridge "A" Level Examinations

Some students enter the University with college-level credits for course work taken while in high school (or in the summer after high-school). If you have earned credits you must have an official transcript sent to the Office of Admissions at Adelphi. Make sure you don't sign up for the same classes once you matriculate here.

The following chart lists the required scores, the Adelphi course equivalents, and the number of credits you will receive for Advanced Placement and IB Higher Level Exams. Please note: Credit can only be awarded for HIGHER LEVEL examinations.

COURSE SUBSTITUTION FOR FOREIGN LAGUAGE REQUIREMENT

Students who are enrolled in Adelphi University and are seeking a B.A. degree from the College of Arts and Sciences may submit a request for a foreign language course substitution based on a qualifying disability (including, but not limited to, language-based learning disability, hearing disability, other communication disabilities, etc.). The request should be made to the Director of the Student Access Office and include supporting documentation from a licensed professional; please be aware that there must be a direct correlation between the diagnosed disability and the necessity for a course substitution to foreign language requirement.

Consideration of a course substitution will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. Waivers to foreign language course requirements will not be permitted. Foreign language courses for programs that must meet state licensing and certification requirements will not be substituted; example, School of Education. American Sign Language (ASL) may be considered as an option for meeting the state mandated foreign language requirement. Students may choose American Sign Language to meet this state mandated requirement.

Should you have a qualifying disability and are seeking a course substitution for foreign language requirement, follow the procedure outlined below:

- Submit a Petition for Reasonable Accommodations form with documentation from a licensed professional to the Student Access Office. The Petition form and Guidelines for Documentation can be found at http://access-office.adelphi.edu/forms/
- 2. The Director of the Student Access Office will review the Petition and documentation in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, and prevailing university policy.
- 3. Upon completion of the review process, the Student Access Office will provide a formal Letter of Accommodation (LOA) to the student through Adelphi email and postal delivery. Please allow for a reasonable time frame to complete this process as requests are reviewed in the order to which they are received.
- 4. The letter will include the contact information of Assistant Dean, College of Arts and Sciences who will determine the appropriate course substitution to the foreign language requirement in consultation with a major advisor. It is the responsibility of the student to inform their Academic Advisor of the approved accommodation and to contact the Assistant Dean, College of Arts and Sciences. For verification purposes, please provide a copy of the Letter of Accommodation (LOA).
- 5. Foreign language course substitutions do not apply to a major, must expose the student to a different culture and may involve a General Education Diploma (GED) global designation, be historical in nature, and may also apply to GED requirements. This may include, but is not limited to, cultural anthropology, music history, art history, global history, ethnicity from a sociological perspective, etc.

Students should seek academic advisement regarding fulfilling the four semester foreign language course requirement well in advance of expected graduation date.

RESOURCES

PROGRESS REPORTS

Adelphi uses Progress Reports to help identify students who may show signs of academic distress. From the beginning of the term, all instructors, look for indications which may include:

- frequent absences/lateness to class
- poor class participation
- failure to complete assignments

Faculty can discuss their concerns with students individually, speak with the student's assigned academic advisor, or call the Office of Academic Services and Retention.

Instructors teaching undergraduate courses are required to indicate those students exhibiting signs of academic distress and note their specific academic problems. An email will then be generated to the student and student's advisor indicating their concern.

If you receive an Progress Report email

- > see it as an opportunity to change, not a reason to give up
- > ask your instructor what you need to do to improve
- > discuss your situation with your academic advisor
- consider seeking support from the Learning Center or Writing Center or Library

DEGREE AUDIT

Degree audit is an online program accessible through the E-Campus (see Section 1 for information on E-Campus). It is an academic advisement tool designed to help you understand the degree requirements for your major. It compares a student's coursework with General Education, Major and Minor requirements. The program takes the courses from your transcript and reorganizes them to show you which of the requirements for your degree you have completed and which ones you still need to fulfill.

With Degree audit students can:

- view the degree requirements for their major
- determine which requirements have been met
- identify which courses still need to be taken
- review grades applied to their transcripts
- see what courses you have taken that do not count towards your major
- view transfer credits and/or waivers applied to your transcript
- confirm your grade-point average (GPA)
- use the "What If" function to find out, before you officially change your major, how the courses completed meet the new major requirements
- estimate how many semesters it will take you to graduate.

Degree audit is designed to assist students in determining their coursework in relation to their degree requirements. It does not replace your transcript, an advisor or the Registrar.

Suggestions for using Degree Audit:

- Before meeting with your academic advisor, view and print your audit.
- Identify which courses you need to complete.
- Create a list of questions to discuss with your advisor.

DEANS, DIRECTORS, CHAIRS

Academic Deans are available in each academic unit to assist students with any questions, concerns and administrative functions related to their course of study in their department. There are several academic deans at Adelphi University:

There is also the Dean of Student Affairs who is responsible for co-curricular offices, functions, and activities that relate to student life, including athletics, commuter students affairs, dining services, disability support services, drug and alcohol counseling, health services, interfaith activities, international student services, judicial affairs, multicultural affairs, orientation, residence halls, student activities, and student counseling services.

The deans rely on associate and assistant deans, directors and chairs to oversee the progress of students in their particular academic units. ACADEMIC RULES AND REGULATIONS

CHANGES IN REGISTRATION

After you register, you may make changes to your registration but you must be aware of the rules for each as well as the deadlines which are listed on the academic calendar on the university website.

ADDING COURSES

Courses can be added to a student's schedule until the end of the second week of classes during a regular semester. A course can be added online or by using an Action Request Form (available in the Registrar's Office). Please be advised that a fee may apply when you make changes in your registration; contact the Cashiers Office for precise information.

DROPPING COURSES

Students may drop courses during the first four weeks of classes during a regular semester (see the academic calendar for exact dates). Dropped courses will not appear on your transcript, but dropping a course or courses may affect your financial aid status. Please be advised that a fee may apply when you make changes in your registration; contact the Cashiers Office for precise information.

WITHDRAWING FROM COURSES

If a student no longer wants to complete a course but it is after the drop date, the student may withdraw from a course until approximately the middle of the semester (see the academic calendar for exact dates). When you withdraw, the course appears on the transcript with a "W" in place of a grade and the student does *not* get credit for the course. After withdrawing from a course, the student no longer attends the course. If you wish to withdraw from a course, you must complete an Action Request Form with the professor's signature on it. Please be advised that a fee may apply when you make changes in your registration; contact the Cashiers Office for precise information.

Note: Nonattendance in a course does not constitute an official drop or withdrawal from a course. Your failure to drop or withdraw properly from a course by not completing an Action Request form will result in a grade of "F."

Note: Dropping or withdrawing from a course or courses may affect your financial aid and status as a full time student. Speak to a financial aid counselor first. International students should discuss any change in course load with the Office of International Student Services.

Note: If you are an athlete, withdrawing from a course may affect your eligibility status. Please speak with an advisor before you withdraw from your courses.

PETITIONS

Academic regulations are established by the University to maintain and enforce academic standards and are adhered to rigorously. If special and unique circumstances occur, any individual student has the right to petition to waive a regulation (such as adding a course or dropping a course after the deadline or changing a course from a letter grade to pass/fail). The University similarly has the right to disapprove any petition on the grounds that the circumstances are not compelling enough to warrant an exception to the established regulation.

Any student petition requesting retroactive action must be submitted within one academic calendar year. Any student petition requesting a medical withdrawal must be submitted during the semester to which it applies.

To begin an Academic Petition, you must submit a written statement and any supporting documentation to the dean of your school. If the student is Undeclared, the petition should be filed through the College of Arts and Sciences.

Approval of an academic petition does not imply financial credit or refund. Such requests must be made directly to the Office of Cashiers.

MEDICAL WITHDRAWAL

To petition for a **medical withdrawal** a student must submit a letter detailing the medical issues along with a supporting letter from a medical professional to the Office of Academic Services and Retention. There is a deadline. Please contact Academic Services for the dates.

FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords students certain rights with respect to their education records. Students will be notified of their FERPA rights annually by publication in the student handbook and the Directory of Classes.

All communication and information regarding academics, discipline, etc. takes place between the University and the student. The FERPA Law stipulates that the University will not permit access to or the release of education records without written consent of the student.

FERPA now permits universities to disclose to parents information concerning a student who is under 21 if it is determined that student violated the University's policy governing the use or possession of alcohol or controlled substances. The University will consider doing so, at its discretion, on a case by case basis.

ACADEMIC ADVISING

ACADEMIC ADVISING

Academic Advising is central to the educational mission of Adelphi University. Advisement is a continuous process that begins with Freshman Registration and culminates in graduation. It challenges and supports students as they examine, determine, and achieve their educational goals.

Every student that enters Adelphi is assigned an academic advisor. If a student has declared a major, they are assigned to a faculty member within that major discipline from that academic unit. If a student is undeclared, they will be assigned an undeclared advisor until they declare a major.

Academic Advising is a **joint** responsibility between advisor and advisee. Advising meetings should focus on the acquisition of the intellectual attitudes, habits, and skills that will enable students to attain educational, personal and career goals. While all students must have their schedule approved by their advisor before they can register, course selection is just one part of the advising process. Understanding how a student will develop as an educated person is an essential part of an advisor/advisee relationship.

Academic advisement is a collaborative effort. Your advisor will guide you, but it is your responsibility to register for courses and complete all degree requirements.

Your advisor is expected to provide:

- accurate and timely information about University policies, procedures, and requirements
- guidance in exploring your academic options and examining your educational goals
- assistance in course selection and scheduling
- assistance in completing academic forms, e.g., Action Request, Petition Procedures, Study at Another Institution/Study Abroad
- reviews of your academic progress throughout your undergraduate study
- confidential referrals concerning academic and personal matters, as needed
- assistance on how to use Adelphi's technologies

You are expected to:

- examine your academic and personal goals prior to initial and subsequent meetings
- take responsibility for your choices and decisions
- develop a tentative list of courses prior to your advising meeting
- arrive promptly to all scheduled meetings
- provide timely notice about any academic problems
- be familiar with the policies, procedures, and requirements detailed in the *Undergraduate Bulletin*, which is online at http://registrar.adelphi.edu/bulletin/

REGISTERING WITH THE COURSE LISTING, ADVISING, AND STUDENT SERVICES SYSTEM (C.L.A.S.S.)

The planning time frame begins approximately three to four weeks before pre-registration begins. In consultation with your advisor, you'll select the courses appropriate for your course of study, indicate the special grading option available (normal, pass/fail, audit) and even select alternates (in case a course you've selected isn't available).

Student's academic schedules must be approved by an advisor before the student can register. It is recommended that students meet in-person with their advisor at least once per semester. A student may pick out courses in person with an advisor and enter the courses into the C.L.A.S.S. system together. The student's classes will then be approved and the student will just have to register at his or her assigned registration time (all students are assigned a specific registration time based on how many credits they have earned; you can find your registration time in C.L.A.S.S.).

A student may also submit his or her course selections to an advisor electronically for approval. To do so, you must enter the courses you would like into the "My Registration" section of C.L.A.S.S. and then press the "Submit" button. This notifies your advisor that you are seeking schedule approval. Until your advisor approves the courses, it will say "pending" next to each course selection. Once your advisor approves your courses, it will change from saying "pending" to "advisor approved." You still must submit your approved schedule for registration. At your appointed time, you enter the system and press the "Submit" button to finalize your semester registration. You'll immediately be able to see your course confirmation, listing your courses and their location when you go back to your registration screen. Remember: you are not registered for your courses until you hit the SUBMIT button and it says "registered" next to each course. If it continues to say "advisor approved" next to course after you submitted the registration, the course no longer has any seats available. The "My Course Confirmation" page displays the listing of all courses you have registered for in a given semester. Listed are the course number, title, credits, meeting time, meeting place, and instructor.

MAJORS AND MINORS

All students must choose a major to graduate. A major is an opportunity for you to study one subject area in depth. The majority of majors are in the College of Arts and Sciences. There are also several professional schools at Adelphi (Robert B. Willumstad School of Business, College of Nursing and Public Health, School of Social Work, Ruth S. Ammon School of Education and Gordon F. Derner Institute of Advanced Psychological Studies). A major in a professional school will help you develop some of the skills necessary to perform in that particular professional field; however, any major may ultimately work in any field. Choosing your major is not choosing your career. When choosing a major, keep in mind that a liberal arts education is not about the acquisition of skills but about becoming an educated individual capable of thinking critically and expressing oneself thoughtfully.

The best advice to consider when choosing a major is to choose a major you are genuinely interested in. **You will excel in a major you intrinsically enjoy.** Choose a major you truly want to learn more about and in which you enjoy taking courses.

Some students come to the university with a major already chosen. Many students are undeclared. Many students change their major at some point during their college career. You must choose a major by the time you have accumulated 60 credits (generally the end of the sophomore year). Adelphi students may formally choose, or declare, their majors at any point during their first four semesters at the University. Majors are declared by obtaining, completing, and submitting a *Change of Major* form to the Office of the Registrar. The major department must sign off on this form.

Students are accepted into a major either during the application process or after completing a change of major form. For most majors, students must be in good academic standing, i.e., their grade-point average meets the minimum level required by the chosen major.

A minor is an opportunity for you to take several courses in a subject area (at least 18 credits) but not as many as a major. Minors are optional and not required for graduation but suggested to individuals interested in multiple academic disciplines. If the credit components of your major allow for enough elective credits, you might consider pursuing a minor to increase the breadth of your education beyond the major, increase the depth of your knowledge in the major, provide you with ancillary area of specialization or because the minor is imply a subject you really like.

Like the major, a minor can be taken to support a specific career direction, but it doesn't have to. For example, a student pursuing a Sociology major may decide to complete a minor in Business to enhance his/her opportunities in the business world. A Management major might minor in Music because s/he simply loves music. A minor also can develop competencies and skills that increase a student's choice of jobs following graduation. Additionally, a minor offers a student the opportunity to explore an area of intellectual or personal interest.

CHANGE OF MAJOR

As you learn more about your preferences and abilities -through course work and by gaining precise knowledge about specific majors and disciplines- students may change their majors.

If you decide to change your major, you should discuss your degree progress with your academic advisor.

If you are considering changing your major, see the Degree Works section of this book. The "What If" function of the Degree Works online computer program, can tell you what classes you would need if you were to change your major.

SEPARATION FROM MAJOR

A major may demand a minimum grade-point average higher than the 2.0 required of all Adelphi undergraduates to remain in good academic standing at the University. Students who do not earn the minimum grade point average required by a major may not be accepted into the major or may be separated from the major.

UNDECLARED STUDENTS

If you have not chosen a major, do not worry. Many students come to college undeclared; about one-third of your freshman class is *Undeclared* and another third will change their major before graduation. College is your time to explore multiple academic areas and there are many options available to you at Adelphi.

You have four semesters (60 credits) to explore and consider all the options before making a choice that is appropriate for you. Consider the following suggestions on your path to finding your major:

- Become aware of the possibilities. This book, the university website and the *Undergraduate Bulletin* give you the basic information about all approved majors at Adelphi. Browse through these publications to acquaint yourself with the range of possible majors.
- The General Education Requirements are designed to help you study a variety of subject areas. While taking the courses that fulfill these requirements, ask yourself if you would like to continue studying in any of the subject areas. Talk to your professors and ask them what further study in a particular area would be like.
- > Talk to your advisor, professors, peers, friends, parents, etc. about their career choices and educational preparation.
- > Visit the departments you are considering majoring in. You can set up a meeting with the department chair to learn more about any major.
- You will excel in a major you intrinsically enjoy. Choose a major you truly want to learn more about and in which you enjoy taking courses.
- ➤ Visit the Career Center to discuss what graduates in different majors have gone on to do after college. Keep in mind that your major does <u>not</u> determine your career choice or career possibilities. Furthermore, if you are concerned about choosing a liberal arts major, liberal arts majors work in every industry including health, government, education, and business.

THE OFFICE OF PRE-PROFESSIONAL ADVISING AND FELLOWSHIPS

The Office of Pre-Professional Advising and Fellowships (OPPAF) supports current Adelphi students and recent graduates who are seeking to apply to professional schools beyond Adelphi in areas of medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, physical therapy and other health professions as well as engineering, environmental studies and law. It is also the office's mission to provide innovative educational initiatives for exceptional students.

This office works in conjunction with faculty advisors providing students with individual advising and guidance during the application process to the professional school of their choice. Also, a great deal of information on graduate study, program descriptions, listings of required standardized tests, and financial aid information is available through various office resources.

Additionally, the office educates students about nationally competitive scholarships to which they may be eligible to apply. The office assists students in the application process for fellowships and honors such as Boren, Fulbright, Goldwater, Mitchell and Rhodes.

OPPAF offers workshops on various topics, invites guest speakers, and assists students in seeking internships or job shadowing opportunities. Our goal is to enhance student preparedness for their professional and educational goals, ultimately taking them beyond Adelphi University.

PREPARATION FOR MEDICAL SCHOOL AND PRE-HEALTH PROFESSIONS

Allopathic Medicine (MD)
Chiropractic Medicine (DC)
Dentistry (DDS) (DMD)
Optometry (OD)
Osteopathic Medicine (DO)
Occupational Therapy

Pharmacy (PharmD)
Physical Therapy (DPT)
Physician Assistant (PA)
Podiatric Medicine (DPM)
Veterinary Medicine (DVM) (VMD)

MAJOR

Students with any and every any major get accepted to medical school. Popular majors for pre-med students include Biology, Biochemistry, Physics, Neuroscience & Psychology but there is no required major to prepare for medical school. While the same holds true for dentistry, several schools prefer Biology or Chemistry. For those pursuing physical therapy the typical majors are either Physical Education/Exercise Science or Biology, although other majors may be appropriate.

REQUIRED COURSES for Most Health Professions include:

- two semesters of English, including one semester of English composition
- two semesters of Biology (0105-111 and 0105-112)
- two semesters of Physics (0156-111 and 0156-112 or 0156-113 and 0156-114)
- two semesters of Chemistry (0106-111, 0106-112)
- one or two semesters of Organic Chemistry (0106-251 and 0106-252)
- Survey of Biochemistry (0105-504 with lab) or Biochemistry 1 & 2 with labs (0106-471 & 0106-472)

Students planning on applying to medical school after 2014 must take Biochemistry, one or more Psychology courses, one more Sociology course and Statistics.

Most medical schools, dental schools and optometry schools require two semesters of mathematics. Some require a year of calculus, 0144-141 and 0144-142.

Many veterinary and dental schools require biochemistry (0106-471 and 0106-472 or 0105-504) and microbiology (0105-238).

Note: The required course work in the sciences is sequential and should be completed by the end of the junior year. Therefore, students need to plan their program of study carefully with their academic advisor. <u>Excellent grades are essential</u>. Doing well on the appropriate admissions test MCAT, DAT, OAT, and/or the GRE is critical.

MAJOR

Students with any and every any major get accepted to law school. Popular majors for pre-law students include Political Science, English, History, Sociology and Psychology.

SUGGESTIONS TO PREPARE FOR LAW SCHOOL

- Create an undergraduate curriculum of breadth and depth.
- Become the most effective writer you can be.
- Develop vour critical reading skills.
- Demonstrate that you can be successful in a variety of challenging courses.
- Major in an area of study that truly interests you.
- Investigate what it is that lawyers do, perhaps by interning in a law office.
- Take at least one course that requires a research paper.
- Get excellent grades!

SUGGESTED TIME TABLE FOR LAW SCHOOL

Freshman and Sophomore Years:

- 1. Pick a major. Get as high a G.P.A. as you can. If you do not have a major which requires writing some large, critical papers, pick some electives that do, especially in the sophomore or junior year.
- 2. Develop a relationship with your major advisor and get to know one of the the prelaw advisors.
- 3. Sign up with the Office of Pre-Professional Advising and Fellowships.
- 4. Explore your interest in law through prelaw society activities, but do not neglect to explore other possibilities in case you change your career goal or you do not have the G.P.A. or LSAT score to get into law school.
- 5. Visit Adelphi's Career Development Center where you will find information on current part-time jobs, summer jobs, or internships related to law, as well as a prelaw library and useful software.

PREPARATION FOR GRADUATE STUDY

Thinking about becoming a professor or an academic researcher? Start studying seriously. Your academic advisor can help you make an appropriate academic plan which should include:

- participation in research projects related to your major or in special academic programs
- participating in the Adelphi Research Conference, National Conference on Undergraduate Research or other similar conferences that support the presentation and publication of outstanding undergraduate research
- inquiring about scholarship awards based upon academic merit and leadership
- applying for prestigious internship opportunities
- researching required standardized tests for your area of interest (GRE, GMAT, etc.)
- getting excellent grades
- requirements specific to your area of study- for example, many graduate liberal arts programs in areas such as English. Philosophy and History require competency in foreign languages

JOINT DEGREE PROGRAMS AT ADELPHI

A number of majors and/or programs offer an opportunity to achieve two degrees: one from Adelphi and one from another school. These joint programs are challenging but can save students who know early on what they would like to study a considerable amount of time. The programs available are listed below. The first number listed is the years spent at Adelphi. The second number is the years required at the other institution. The same is true for the degrees.

DENTISTRY WITH NEW YORK UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY 3-4 B.S./D.M.D.

Students accepted into the Program will matriculate at Adelphi for their first three academic years in the Program. A student's eligibility to remain in the program is contingent upon maintaining a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.5 for each semester at Adelphi. Grades of lower than a C in any required course necessities being dropped from the program

DENTISTRY WITH THE LECOM SCHOOL OF DENTAL MEDICINE

4+4 Early Acceptance Program

The 4+4 Early Acceptance Program in which Adelphi University undergraduate students are enrolled by Adelphi University and accepted by LECOM as participants in the EAP. A Cumulative Overall GPA ≥ 3.4 and Cumulative Science GPA ≥ 3.2. The GPAs will be determined by LECOM. Grades from all completed courses, including repeated courses, will be used. DAT: Scores in the area of 20 or higher will be expected for the Academic Average, Reading Comprehension and Perceptual Ability sections.

ENGINEERING WITH COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY

3-2 B.A./B.S. or 4-2 B.A./M.S. - Contact: Gottipaty Rao (516) 877-4877 rao@adelphi.edu

Students interested in engineering have the option of two joint degree programs. The first program offers a bachelor's degree from Adelphi (in a selected major such as Physics, Math/Computer Sciences, Biology, Chemistry) and a B.S. in an engineering discipline from the participating institution. In the second program, students earn a B.S. from Adelphi and an M.S. in a field of engineering from the graduate school.

LAW WITH ALBANY LAW SCHOOL

3-3 B.A./B.S./LLD

Students must earn a 3.3 index and score at or above the median of the previous entering class on LSAT in order to be considered by Albany Law School.

LAW WITH THE DREXEL UNIVERSITY-THOMAS KLINE SCHOOL OF LAW 3+3/4+3 EARLY ASSURANCE PROGRAM -

Maintain a GPA sufficient to reach at least a 3.4 by the time of application to the Thomas R. Kline School of Law. Earn a LSAT score at least equal to the median LSAT for Drexel's 1-L class in the year the student was admitted to Adelphi University.

MEDICINE WITH THE LAKE ERIE COLLEGE OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE 3+4& 4+4 B.S./D.O

High School applicants are selected for an interview at LECOM and up to five students are selected for the program. If selected to the program a student will be exempt from taking the MCAT exam dependent upon maintaining at least a 3.5 GPA.

MEDICINE WITH THE PHILADELPHA COLLEGE OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE 4-4 B.S./D.O.

Five or possibly more students are selected each year for recommendation for consideration and interview by PCOM. Specific grade point averages and MCAT scores must be maintained and achieved.

MEDICINE WITH THE NYIT COLLEGE OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE 4+4 B.S./D.O. ADMISSIONS EARLY INTERVIEW PROGRAM

To be eligible for this early interview program the applicant must have completed the first two years of undergraduate education at Adelphi University and meet and maintain the following criteria: Overall and science grade point averages of 3.5, a favorable recommendation by the Premedical Council at Adelphi

MEDICINE WITH SUNY UPSTATE MEDICAL UNIVERSITY 4+4 ACCELERATED SCHOLARS

Participants who have been selected by SUNY Upstate can major in most in Liberal Arts and Sciences and Fine Arts programs. They must complete all science requirements: Biology, Chemistry, Organic Chemistry, Biochemistry and Physics at Adelphi. Students must maintain a 3.0 GPA with no grade below a C-. Students must take the PCAT.

PHARMACY WITH THE ALBANY COLLEGE OF PHARMACY AND HEALTH SCIENCES 3+4, 4+4 AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

PARTICIPANTS MUST COMPLETE Biological Concepts and Methods I and II ,Genetics, Bio 224 Research Project Lab, Category I course (Ecology & Evolutionary Biology),Capstone course in final 2 semesters at Adelphi, General Chemistry I &II, Organic Chemistry I & II with Lab, Statistics for Natural Sciences, Physics I &II, Calculus I, and Microbiology, at least 90 credits at Adelphi with a 3.0 GPA

PHARMACY WITH THE BUFFALO SCHOOL OF PHARMACY AND PHARMACEUTICAL SCIENCES 4+4 COLLABORATIVE AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

Minimum grade point average (GPA) of 3.5 at Adelphi University. All prerequisite courses must be successfully completed with a grade of C or better. Students must complete at least one year of English composition, one year of biology, one year of general chemistry, one year of organic chemistry, one year of calculus, one semester of physics, one semester of statistics, one semester of microbiology, one semester of anatomy, one year of physiology, one semester of biochemistry, and one semester of any social or behavioral science. The PCAT is required for all PharmCAS applicants.

PHYSICAL THERAPY WITH NEW YORK MEDICAL COLLEGE 4-3 B.S./D.P.T.

This early acceptance program prepares students to become competent and caring physical therapists who will be able to skillfully practice in a variety of clinical settings and evolve with changes in the health care system.

PHYSICAL THERAPY WITH NEW YORK INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

4-3 B.S./D.P.T. - Contacts: John Wygand (516) 877-4275 wygand@adelphi.edu

The early decision program with NYIT allows up to four (4) exceptional exercise science majors at Adelphi after completing their Bachelor of Science degree in Exercise Science to continue to NYIT's Doctor of Physical Therapy program. Adelphi students are recommended by the Exercise Science faculty.

PODIATRY WITH THE NEW YORK COLLEGE OF PODIATRIC MEDICINE 3-4 B.A. or B.S./DPM.

Students interested in podiatric medicine can either upon admission to Adelphi or after they have enrolled, qualify to become a podiatric physician and receive a bachelor's degree after completing their 3 years at Adelphi and the first year at NYCPM.

VETERINARIAN WITH ROSS UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF VETERINARY MEDICINE 4-4 B.A. or B.S./DPM. –

Ross University School of Veterinary Medicine is accredited by the American Veterinary Medical Association, students formally apply once at Adelphi who have achieved a 3.3 GPA and met other criteria including doing well on the GRE and demonstrating formal experience with animals.

INTERNSHIPS

Internships are highly recommended for all undergraduate students. A college internship will bring together your academic studies and real world experience. Including an internship on your resume will assist you in your search for a job after school. Employers want to hire graduating students who have career-related work experience during college. There are several additional benefits to participating in an internship:

- An internship gives you the opportunity to "test drive" a career; to see if it's really for you during a summer or semester before you make a long-term commitment and accept a job offer.
- Through an internship you can develop a network of professional contacts that may be used for future references during your job search or in application to graduate school, fellowships or scholarships.

You will be able to learn from skilled and experienced professionals about potential careers as well as the structure of organizations and the current job market.

"AN INTERNSHIP? WHAT'S THAT, AND WHY DO I WANT ONE?"

Internships are ideal opportunities for students to be exposed to the professional world beyond campus for short duration periods, usually 12 weeks or less. An internship can allow a student to experience the actual responsibilities of a full-time job that the student may not normally be hired (i.e., qualified) to perform in a short-term, mentored, learning environment.

What are the benefits of Internships?

Internships are an outstanding way to provide students with practice work experience in their chosen fields. They provide a number of tangible benefits to students, which include:

- Allowing for the exploration of various industry and career possibilities
- Helping to identify suitable positions for future full-time employment
- Assisting in the development of relevant work experience
- Helping to clarify your career objective and presenting you as "career focused"
- The possibility of earning academic credit and/or money
- Potential of a full-time offer

When are Internships offered?

An internship may be one semester, a summer, or a length of time agreed upon by the student, employer, and school, and may be paid or unpaid. Many companies offer internships year round, making the planning of a student's career path during college more predictable and possible.

Can I get credit for an Internship?

Internships are primarily single, planned educational experiences for students. As such, they may receive academic credit for their internship work in agreement with and under the supervision of an Adelphi University department faculty member.

Must Internships conform to certain quality standards?

Adelphi University is committed to providing rich and valuable educational experiences to its students. Internships have long played an important role in providing significant, practical and enriching academic experiences. Accordingly, Adelphi University has developed the following standards to ensure that student internships are appropriate and beneficial components of an Adelphi education. These Standards, submitted to the Faculty Senate and approved on December 15, 2008, are currently in the process of being expanded and strengthened, but currently cover the following areas:

Site Standards

Reputable Institution To Provide Internship Site

As determined by the departmental faculty internship advisors, a review of potential organizations to assure appropriate work environment should be conducted by the academic department or other appropriate campus office.

Defined Task or Job Description

The internship must be an educationally meaningful assignment, as determined by the departmental faculty internship advisor(s). A written job description is required that should include intern skills sought, specific intern responsibilities or the project(s) to which the intern will be assigned.

Supervision Standards

On Site Supervision

There must be a site contact person with whom the faculty advisors and interns can communicate.

• Site Visit or Evaluation of Site Provider

Each academic department, as it deems appropriate, must in some way evaluate the site where a student will be participating in an internship.

Multi-Directed Student Evaluation

As determined by the departmental faculty or internship advisor(s), student interns should periodically be evaluated by the faculty advisors on the progress of their internship learning experience. The faculty internship advisor(s) will, by means he/she determines appropriate and to the extent he/she determines necessary, communicate with the site supervisor to obtain feedback on a student intern's learning progress.

Student Requirements

• Formal Reflection Component

A formal reflection component must be completed and submitted by student interns to the faculty internship advisor(s). The format, structure, and timeline of the reflection component will be determined by the departmental faculty or as specified in the program's internship course syllabus.

Credit Standards

Number of Credits Earned

The credits earned will be determined by the departmental policy or faculty internship advisor(s). A variable number of credits can be earned based on a minimum of 50 hours of work per credit hour or the internship experience may be tied to an existing credit bearing course.

Eligibility Standards

• GPA, Credits Completed or Course Prerequisites

Candidates for internships must be in good academic standing as determined by the departmental faculty internship advisors. Each academic department can establish its own requirements for minimum GPA, minimum number of credits completed, prerequisite courses or other academic standards of student performance.

What kind of companies offer Internships?

Adelphi students have interned in both big and small firms, local companies as well as international giants, those that specialize in certain fields and those that offer internships in a wide variety of experiences. Some of these include: MSG, Disney-ABC, Warner Music Group, KPMG, Glaxo, NBC Universal, Canon, NYC Department of Education, Enterprise

Rent-A-Car, Cablevision, Make-A-Wish, The New York Yankees, Ernst & Young, Price Waterhouse, 1-800-Flowers, JP Morgan Chase, and numerous hospitals and schools throughout the metropolitan New York City and Long Island region.

How do I begin finding an Internship?

The Career Center posts and maintains hundreds of internships via *Handshake*, Adelphi University's online job and internship posting system. Students can query on internship postings by industry, job category, desired major, paid vs. unpaid, and many other criteria designed to maximize the student's ability to search for the right internship. *Handshake* is open and available 24 hours a day, seven days a week via the student's PC, laptop, tablet, or smartphone. Students may also make an appointment to speak with a Career Counselor about internship offerings and the ways in which a student can prepare to apply for internships.

How can I maximize my Internship experience?

Hundreds of internships are constantly offered via the Career Center's online job and internship posting system, *Handshake*. Accordingly, hundreds of students throughout the school year and summer enjoy both a professionally and personally rewarding internship experience by properly preparing themselves for the competitive environment through which good internships are found.

- 1. Resume Readiness The Career Center can help you here. A good resume captures the various experiences you have had and quantifies your qualifications. Cover letters are also a part of this step.
- 2. Company Research Students looking for internships will have to spend time researching the company/ies they are interested in working for. Knowing more about the company give the student an edge in applying, especially during the interview process.
- 3. *Interview Preparation* Cover letters may get the resume read, and a good resume may get you an interview, but it is a great interview that gets you the job or internship. Again, the Career Center can help you here.
- 4. Speak with a Career Counselor It can be difficult if not sometimes confusing to deal with the myriad of choices and options that internships present to students. Students may find some clarity in dealing with this situation by discussing their internship needs with the Career Counselors at the Career Center, one of whom is dedicated to Adelphi University's Internship Program. Counselors can also speak with students about the "Four Year Plan" and P.R.E.P. and provide often needed guidance, advice, and direction to help students achieve success in their future professional pursuits.
- 5. Investigate and apply to our "major programs" Such as the annual summer paid internship experience, the Jaggar Community Fellows Program. Adelphi University, on Long Island and even throughout the New York metropolitan area, offers paid full-time summer internships exclusively at nonprofit organizations designed to give students substantive experiential learning opportunities. There are also fall and spring semesters counterparts to this summer program The application period begins in January. In 2018, the JCFP featured nearly 90 competitive internship postings and over 150 student applicants vying for 70 select spots in the program. Students must be registered on Handshake to apply.

As mentioned above, the Career Center stands ready to help undergraduates, graduates, and alumnae with **resume and interview workshops, internship workshops, and one-on-one counseling** to aid, assist, and prepare you for the internship and job pursuits that you will no doubt find yourself in during your time here at Adelphi.

While the path to a successful career can often be found through a richly rewarding internship experience, Adelphi students must know that they need not worry about undertaking the effort of finding a valuable and profitable internship alone. While it is important for an organization to provide you with a quality and structured internship experience, and while, ultimately, it is you that will make the most of your internship experience, the issues addressed above are intended to give you guidance in selecting, preparing for, and thereby enhancing your internship experience. You must put the strategies to work yourself, and the Career Center will be both your major and primary source for learning and accomplishing those strategies. Doing so will not only lead to a great internship experience, but will undoubtedly lead to further and greater opportunities in your chosen career.

THE SCHOLAR TEACHER EDUCATION PROGRAM (S.T.E.P.)

The Scholar Teacher Education Program (S.T.E.P) is a unique, five-year combined bachelor's and master's program that integrates field-intensive clinical practice with a strong foundation in the liberal arts and sciences. It prepares candidates to teach at the childhood (grades 1-6) and adolescence (grades 7-12) levels. Graduates who successfully complete the fifth year of the program are then eligible for New York State Department of Education certification

in childhood or adolescence education.

With the exception of dance, undergraduates major in all liberal arts subjects in the College of Arts and Sciences, as well as the Derner Institute (Psychology). They also take education courses and participate in field-based studies in elementary and secondary schools. After completing their undergraduate degree, S.T.E.P students immediately begin a master's degree in childhood or adolescence education. Fifth-year students take a three-semester sequence (summer, fall, and spring) that includes student teaching or an internship to complete all requirements for certification.

Introduced in 1995, the S.T.E.P program is both comprehensive and economical. Students in this competitive program stay together as a group throughout the program. From the start, students are assigned faculty advisors to guide them in their course and field work.

STEP TESOL Education is a unique, five-year, combined bachelor's and master's program for undergraduate students preparing to teach school-age English language learners in PreK-12 classrooms. The program leads to the B.A./M.A. or B.S./M.A. degrees and New York State certification in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL). The program provides a combination of current theory and practical application in English as a Second Language (ESL) instruction and prepares teachers to meet the needs of diverse communities.

Students in STEP TESOL Education must major in one of the liberal arts and sciences and complete all the University and NYS certification General Education requirements. All liberal arts majors that lead to a B.A. or B.S. degree including economics (from the School of Business) and psychology (from the Derner Institute) are acceptable majors. The structure of STEP TESOL Education is particularly effective in meeting the needs of the transfer student. Like all students in the B.A./M.A. or B.S./M.A. TESOL Program, transfer students must meet the 12 credit foreign language requirement.

Accordingly, an extended internship experience in Washington is incorporated into the minor to expose students to the practical consequence of government decisions and to the broader principles of public good that are supposed to guide these decisions. This minor is compatible with the University's mission of developing critical thinking and analytic skills necessary to sustain and support both political society and the personal progress of our students after they graduate from Adelphi. This program is for any student wanting to spend a semester or summer as an intern in Washington, D.C., while receiving 12 or 15 Adelphi academic credits. See fuller description of the internship program below. Preference is given to those applying for internships in their sophomore/junior year or the first semester of their senior year. Prerequisites include: four political science courses, including a seminar (for a total of 21-24 credits), a 3.3 GPA overall, and approval of the Political Science Internship Committee.

Students interested in the internship must plan ahead in their sophomore or even freshman years so that they

BA/MS Environmental Studies Program

The Environmental Studies 5-year program provides students with the opportunity to complete a BA and MS within 5 years of study. It is intended primarily for students who would like to 1) accelerate their graduate schooling by one year; and 2) gain specialized training for employment in environmental fields beyond the Bachelor of Arts degree. A maximum of 12 credits of 500-level and above courses can be taken in the senior year for undergraduate credit and also applied directly toward the MS requirements. Upon earning the Environmental Studies, B.A., with permission of the Graduate Coordinator, students may matriculate into the Master of Science degree. The graduate credits earned during the senior year (see below) will be added to the student's graduate transcript, enabling the completion of the Master of Science in Environmental Studies with as little as 21 credits in the fifth year.

Because the study of history requires a broad perspective on the human condition, history majors are encouraged to take courses in allied disciplines like sociology, political science, anthropology, languages and literature, and art history. To this end, students must have the permission of their advisor and the department chair to count more than 45 HIS (0136) credits towards the 120 they need for graduation with a BA in history.

Dedicated students with the talent and interest for working independently, and for whom a traditional major may not serve his or her intellectual goals, may petition to complete an Interdisciplinary Studies major of carefully planned work from two or more departments. The student will be supervised by a three-person faculty advisor committee to assure that the program embodies a disciplined cumulative study that moves from elementary through more advanced levels of work. Students should be aware that this option would not always be available to those within a prescribed program leading to professional certification and/or licensure.

Procedures

Students must declare their intention to pursue the Interdisciplinary Studies major prior to the beginning of their fifth semester of study by petitioning a three-person faculty advisory committee. Transfer students with 64 credits or less (including those with a two-year degree from institutions affiliated with Adelphi University) will be eligible to petition for the Interdisciplinary major as well, but not later than their first semester in attendance.

The student's interdisciplinary advisory committee will consist of his/her academic advisor (normally from the discipline most central to the inquiry) as well as two other faculty members selected by the advisor and faculty head/department chair. The three-person committee should be representative of at least two of the areas intended for study. The advisor will notify the dean when new advisory committees and programs of study have been formed.

The student's approved program must have 18 to 24 credits of in-depth work in a single disciplinary area. In addition, the major should total no less than 36 credits, and might be more based upon the decision of the student's advisory committee. Student eligibility for and good standing within the Interdisciplinary major will reflect the standards of the particular unit as well as criteria established by the student's faculty advisor, advisory committee, the faculty head/department chair and dean's office.

The three-person advisory committee must meet with the declared students once each semester until graduation to discuss their work, progress, and plans for subsequent studies. A brief report of each meeting will be submitted to the related faculty head and dean's office.

Students pursuing the interdisciplinary studies major will be expected to complete a senior culminating project reflecting their interdisciplinary study. Projects should be approved by the advisory committee, and notification of successful completion forwarded to the faculty head and dean.

Students who are pursuing a B.A. in Interdisciplinary Studies must complete up to Level IV of a foreign language. Students may elect to sit for the language competency examination to be exempt from the reading competency in a foreign language requirement.

ePortfolio Requirement will be used as an advising and assessment tool beginning with 1st year student. Every student will create their own online academic profile that will include learning goals, courses, and extracurricular experiences. Students and their advisors will have access to these profiles to track one's academic experience, and encourage the practice of articulating goals and professional preparation and presentation. Students will use the current ePortfolio system utilized by Psychology Majors known as the Comprehensive Assessment Portfolio. At a minimum the portfolio will include sample work from the Writing in Psychology and Psychological Research courses, sample work from at least one concentration course, an interdisciplinary course and the capstone project.

The Comprehensive Assessment Portfolio (CAP), a requirement for students wishing to continue in the major, is a cumulative record of a student's work in psychology, based on 6 required courses taken during their first four semesters or 60 credits (transfer students will be advised individually on portfolio requirements). In the semester in which the Psychology CAP will be completed (usually their fourth semester), or the semester immediately following, students register for the CAP course (PIA 399). Students' CAP will be reviewed by their advisors and those students who are not achieving an adequate level of competency will be offered remediation while enrolled in the CAP course.

GLOSSARY

Α

Academic Advisor – A member of the faculty or another professional who provides academic advice and guidance to students

Academic Calendar – The Academic Calendar lists all the days when classes are in session, including last days to Add or Drop a course. It can be accessed through the University website.

Adding Courses – This is when a student adds a course to their registration

Adjunct Faculty – Faculty member who teach part-time without appointments in the regular faculty

Admissions Office – The office responsible for admitting students to the institution

Associate Degree – Degree granted upon the completion of a two-year academic program mostly offered at two-year institutions. Adelphi only offers an Associate Degree in University College.

Auditing – Taking a class to acquire knowledge but not for credit or grades. Audited courses do not count toward degree requirements

В

Bachelor's Degree – The first university degree awarded upon the completion of an undergraduate curriculum. The degrees are usually known as "bachelor of arts" or "bachelor of science." Adelphi also offers the BBA (bachelor of business arts), the BFA (bachelor of fine arts), and the BSW (bachelor of social work).

Bulletin – The University's catalog of programs, curricula and courses

C

C.L.A.S.S. (Course Listing, Advising and Student Services) – An online programs that offers access to important student information. It can be used from any computer, anywhere, that can reach the internet. This includes your course registration (when available), your course confirmation (listing room locations), your financial aid, your bills, your grades, your transcript, and course directory (including seats available).

Commencement – Graduation ceremony held in May

Credit – Refers to academic coursework. A student earns credits for the successful completion of each course for each academic term. Adelphi sets a minimum number of credits required to graduate. At Adelphi, we have the one per hour/week in class system of earning credit, which means that to earn one credit you have to spend one hour in-class per week for fifteen weeks.

Cumulative Grade Point Average – The numerical average of all the student's grades achieved during the period of study at an institution

D

Dean – A Dean is in charge of a division of the university. There are several Academic Deans at Adelphi University and also the Dean of Student Affairs. The Deans along with the Associate and Assistant Deans oversee the progress of students in their particular academic units.

Dean of Students – Dean of Students represents the head of the "student life side" of the campus.

Dean's List – A published list of students who have earned a 3.5 grade-point average in a term.

Declared – Refers to a student who has declared a major.

Degree Audit – Degree Audit is an online program. It is an academic advisement tool designed to help you understand the degree requirements for your major.

Department – The formal faculty group, together with its support stuff, responsible for instruction in a general subject area

Department Chair – A tenured faculty member who oversees an academic department

Directory of Classes – The Directory of Classes is a copy of all the classes offered by Adelphi. It is published by the University Registrar. It includes schedule and registration information, an academic calendar, a chart of tuition and fees, a listing of pertinent policies, a list of classes suitable for General Education requirements, and a final examination schedule. You can find the directory online.

Doctoral Degree – The doctorate (Ph.D., Doctor of Philosophy, or Ed.D., Doctor of Education) is the highest degree awarded. It requires course work, comprehensive examinations, original research, and a dissertation. A minimum of three years of study is generally required beyond the master's level.

Double Major – Program of study in which a student completed the requirements of two majors at the same time.

Dropping Courses – Students are permitted to remove a course from their course schedule during the first four weeks of the semester. This called dropping a course. Dropped courses will not appear on your transcript, but dropping a course or courses may affect your financial aid status and/or your health insurance.

E-Campus – An online portal giving you one-stop access to information, services, and applications. This includes Adelphi Email, ALICAT, Blackboard, Campus Announcements, C.L.A.S.S., Degree Audit, Message Boards, My Housing and much more.

Electives – A course chosen freely by the student from the institution's offerings.

F

Faculty – The teaching personnel in a department, division, or an entire institution

Fellow – A student granted a "fellowship" on the basis of academic achievement

FERPA (The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act) - A federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. Under this law, the university does not permit access to or the release of education records without written consent of the student.

Full-time – Student taking 12 or more credits during any given term

G

General Education Requirements – The General Education requirements are a set of course requirements that all Adelphi undergraduates must fulfill in order to get a degree. Some requirements like The Freshmen Orientation Experience, The Freshmen Seminar, and The Art and Craft of Writing will be met in the freshmen year.

Graduate – A person who has successfully completed a program of study and earned a final award.

Incomplete – Temporary grade indicating that the student has not met all course assignments at the end of the term. The professor must complete an Incomplete Contract stipulating how and when the work will be completed. If the student does not complete the work within one year, the "I" automatically becomes an "F" on the student's transcript.

Independent Study – An assignment (reading or research) carried out by a student under faculty supervision for credit. Students may take no more than 12 credits of independent study.

Internship – Supervised professional training designed to allow students to apply previously acquired skills and knowledge to practical situations. Can be taken for credit.

L

Learning Center – The Learning Center provides a wide array of services geared toward enhancing students' academic performance at Adelphi University. As a resource center it is staffed by university peer tutors. The Learning Center's resources are available to all undergraduate and graduate students enrolled on any Adelphi University campus and is located in the Nexus Building.

Liberal Arts – The traditional fields of study in the humanities, sciences and social sciences as distinct from technical and professional education.

M

Major – Undergraduate student's area of specialization, it consists of a number of courses in one field. All student must declare a major by the time they have accumulated 60 credits.

Master's Degree – A post-baccalaureate degree usually earned after one or two years of course work.

Minor – A secondary area of concentration; usually 18-24 credits.

N

Non-matriculated – Enrolled in courses but not in a program leading to a degree.

Office of Academic Services and Retention – The Office of Academic Services and Retention is dedicated to helping each student realize his/her full academic potential. It does this by providing academic advisement and monitoring all academic standards and procedures as well as providing students and faculty with the information they need to make informed decisions. It is located in the Nexus Building.

Р

Part-time – Student taking fewer than 12 credits a semester.

Pass/Fail – The Pass/Fail grade option is designed to encourage students to explore disciplines outside their major with affecting their GPA. The letter P (Pass) or F (Fail) are the only grades assigned when the student chooses this option. Pass/Fail *can not* be used to fulfill a major, minor requirement. The only General Education Requirements that can be taken Pass/Fail is the Second Competency.

Petitions – Academic petitions are requests for an exception to an academic rule or deadline. If you meet deadlines and comply with regulations, you should not need to petition for a postponement or exception. Financial Petitions are requests filed with Collections.

Ph.D. (Doctor of Philosophy) – The highest earned degree awarded in the world.

Planning – The time period before registration in which you should meet with your academic advisor to discuss course selection and your academic goals.

Prerequisite – A course which must be completed before a student is allowed to register for a more advanced course.

Probation – A status imposed on students whose work is unsatisfactory until they improve their performance or are asked to leave the program or institution.

Progress Reports – Notification from a Professor to a student indicating their concern of the students performance in their class.

Provost – The chief academic officer of the institution.

R

Registrar – The office responsible for registering students and maintaining their educational records.

Registration – The formal process of enrolling students in courses. At Adelphi all students must have their course of study approved by an academic advisor before they can register.

S

Seminar – A small class of students which meets with a professor to discuss specialized topics

Senior Thesis - Year-long original research for students in the Honors College often growing from earlier Honors projects.

SGA (**The Student Government Association**) - Represents student interests and concerns to the University administration. Its primary role is to serve as the voice of students. The SGA also allocates funds to student organizations, sponsors awareness days, and hosts speakers on campus.

STEP (Scholar Teacher Education Program) - A unique, five-year combined bachelor's and master's program that integrates field-intensive programs with a strong foundation in the liberal arts and sciences. It prepares candidates to teach at the childhood (grades 1-6) and adolescence (grades 7-12) levels. Graduates who successfully complete the fifth year of the program are then eligible for New York State Department of Education certification in childhood or adolescence education

Study Abroad – Adelphi students can enrich their academic experience by studying abroad. The Center for International Education (CIE) offers programs that go for a couple of weeks during the semester, or during the summer or programs that span an entire academic year. Students also have the opportunity to participate in study abroad programs run by educational institutions affiliated with Adelphi.

Syllabus – A syllabus is a written description of a course that the instructor provides to the students. It includes a listing of assignments, a statement of course policies regarding absences and grades, and a schedule of tests.

T

Transcript – The official record of a student's academic performance at an institution. An official transcript has the Registrar's stamp on it and is often requested in a sealed envelope; an unofficial transcript does not have this stamp and can be printed by a student through C.L.A.S.S.

Transfer Credit – Credit awarded toward a degree on the basis of studies completed at another institution

U

Undeclared – An undeclared student is a student who has not yet declared a major.

Undergraduate – (1) Description of a post-secondary program leading to a bachelor's degree; (2) A student enrolled in such a program.

Undergraduate Bulletin – The Undergraduate Bulletin outlines the requirements for each major and provides a brief description for most courses taught at Adelphi. It also lists all the university rules and regulations.

Unofficial Transcript - An unofficial transcript does not have the Registrar's stamp and can be printed by a student through C.L.A.S.S.

W

Withdrawing from a class – A student may withdraw from a course until approximately the middle of the semester. A student would withdraw from a course if s/he felt s/he could not successfully complete the course and it is past the drop date. When a student withdraws, the student receives a "W" in place of a grade on the transcript. The "W" does not impact the GPA or a student's full-time status. The student does not receive any credit for the course.

Withdrawing from the University – Formal process of leaving an institution before (and without) completing a degree. A student should always speak with an academic advisor before withdrawing from the university. Withdrawing can also have financial implications and students should check with Student Financial Services before withdrawing.

Writing Center – Located in the Nexus Building the Writing Center is the hub of writing-related activity at Adelphi University. Its primary purpose is to help students learn to use writing more effectively in all aspects of college life. The Writing Center is designed for any student, of any ability, who wants to improve his or her writing process.



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
